Norms and Nicotine

A systematic review of normative processes and tobacco use behaviors among sexual and gender minority populations

Background

Tobacco use disparities persist within sexual and gender minority (SGM) populations, highlighting the need for a comprehensive understanding of the factors contributing to these disparities.

Research Questions

How does the normative social environment influence tobacco use behaviors among sexual and gender minority populations?


Methods


Rapid systematic review. Title and abstract searches were conducted in June of 2022 and April 2023 by a medical librarian using keywords that described SGM populations, tobacco use behavior, and social norms. Databases: PubMed, PsycInfo, Applied Social Sciences Index & Abstracts, and Cochrane CENTRAL. A grey literature search was also conducted. Two independent researchers reviewed titles and abstracts for inclusion.




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Explanatory models of tobacco use in sexual and gender minority populations should include normative processes









Theoretical **Propositions**

- 1. SGM identity is associated with structural characteristics (e.g., homophily) of social networks that promote tobacco use.
- Normative social environments directly affect tobacco use behaviors (TUB) independent of minority stress: Higher descriptive norms ↑ TUB; Lower injunctive norms ↑ TUB; Lower social support ↑ TUB.
- 3. Normative social environments moderate the affect of minority stress (MS) on TUB: MS->TUB is magnified within ↑ normative tobacco social environments. The mechanisms of action are (a) behavior modeling, (b) social comparison, and (c) social rewards/reinforcement.

Conclusion

Tobacco control interventions for sexual and gender minority populations should consider the multifaceted impact of the social environment.
